## JOHN SINGER SARGENT: MASTER WITH A BRUSH lecture by Jane Oneail

The 19th century portrait painter John Singer Sargent found success creating flattering likenesses with virtuoso brushwork. His fluid, buttery brushstrokes and ability to render luxurious silks, satins, and velvets made him a favorite among the upper class and aristocracy. Despite this, his career was punctuated by criticism and controversy, including the scathing

reception of major works like *Madame X* (1884) and *Isabella Stewart Gardner* (1888). Sargent himself admitted, "Every time I paint a portrait, I lose a friend." Through it all, his talent with a brush—or what Sargent referred to as "the horny hand of toil"—proved to be his redemption, earning him an endless string of patrons and opportunities.


This program will provide an overview of Sargent's career, from his daring and experimental works as an ambitious young artist drawing inspiration from his travels, through his celebrated Grand manner portraits of the European and American elite, to his major commissions including murals in Boston, and later watercolors (as well as the scandals along the way!).




Self-Portrait 1906 oil on canvas Collection of the Uffizi Gallery
